Production

Nominal catches of lobster averaged 2,000 tons per year during the period 1987-1990 and consisted mainly of European lobster, Homarus gammarus. The United Kingdom, France and Ireland are the main EC producers (**Source:** FAO).

France is by far the largest EC importer of lobsters followed by Italy, Belgium and Germany. Canada and the United States are the leading suppliers to the EC. However, the large majority of smaller suppliers are developing countries such as Cuba, Brazil, Yemen, South Africa, India, Senegal, Oman, Morocco, Belize, Tunisia, United Arab Emirates, Mauritania, Togo, Cape Verde, Costa Rica, Mexico, Iran, Panama, Somalia, Ghana, Kenya and Madagascar.

Various shellfish species are commonly called lobsters whereas only two clawed varieties are strictly defined as such: the American lobster (Homarus americanus) and the European lobster (Homarus gammarus). Other types of "lobsters" like the rock lobster and the crayfish, spiny and non-clawed, are equally known and appreciated.

Lobsters are still considered in Europe as a gourmet product and peak market demand occurs during special periods like Christmas and New Year or for other festive events which differ from country to country. Consumption is also higher between May and July, corresponding to the European lobster landings period.

Imported lobsters are marketed live or frozen in brine to fish wholesalers. At the end-user's level, the hotel and restaurant industry offers the best sales potential, especially for small/medium sized lobsters (400/600 g).

Market access

EC member states apply the Common External Tariff:

No duties are levied on imports of lobsters from ACP countries (African, Caribbean and Pacific countries), from the Maghreb and from Turkey.

Under the GSP scheme (Generalized System of Preferences) a preferential tariff, ranging from 4% to 7% is granted to developing countries (imports of lobster from Least Developed Countries enter duty-free).

A single market regulation for fish, covering production, processing, and trading (including sanitary regulation) is expected to enter in force on 31 December 1995.

The following FAO publication gives details on Recommended International Code of Practice and International Standards on lobster: CAC/RCP 24-1979 and CAC/RS 95-1978.

Prices

Usually, live products are twice the price of frozen products. They are subject to wide fluctuations, and price levels double easily in winter. Quotations for frozen items show less variation.

During the last few years, lobster has become relatively more accessible, as prices were stable, setting lobsters that were out of reach for some consumers within the range of festive products that are affordable.

Infofish Trade News (see address below) publishes price information on fish and fish products, including lobster.

Packaging and transport

Imported live lobsters are generally shipped by plane in order to reduce mortality rate and should be packed in compliance with the regulations of the airline involved.

Live lobsters are normally put dry into watertight polystyrene boxes of 10 kg net weight or less and protected by outer cartons wrapped in plastic film. Inside the boxes, cushion should be provided by wood fibre or paper and appropriate chilling ensured by layers of crushed ice or wet and chilled sawdust possibly complemented by freezer packs (isothermic blocs/pouches). The pincers of Homarus spp. should be taped shut.

Increasingly popular is the so called "popsicle pack" for frozen lobsters in brine: the product is precooked, vacuum-packed in salt water and put in layers of crushed ice.

Distribution channels

Imports are generally handled by specialized fishery firms. The usual system of distribution in the EC is from importer to local wholesaler who distributes to caterers and retailers (see list of importers).

Sales promotion

Some exporters and retailers are introducing recipe leaflets in order to present the product to new customers. However, marketing of lobster is still a challenging task, as this product is still considered by the majority of consumers as an exclusive delicacy.

A number of trade fairs, specializing in food and seafood products, take place in the EC, representing an important opportunity for observing evolution and trends of the demand and for making business contacts.

Market opportunities

As the average retail price of lobsters tends to be stable (about 5% increase over the last three years) and promotional activities have been enhanced and improved (particularly at the end of the year), the market should continue to expand in the EC. According to trade sources, imports of lobster in the EC grew in 1992, and the trend will continue in the near future.

Good opportunities can be seized by conducting research on the processing side, introducing new lobster products characterized by innovative packaging methods (for example the brine pack), in order to make the product more accessible to larger groups of consumers.

0306.11-000: Total imports 33,056 of which: Australia 9,298, Cuba 4,265, South Africa 3,808, India 3,154, Brazil 3,107. Important suppliers among developing countries are also Namibia, Pakistan, Vietnam, Philippines, Madagascar, Mozambique and Indonesia.

0306.12-000: Total imports 3,571 of which: Canada 2,233, United States 596, Australia 389. Important suppliers among developing countries are India, Brazil, Philippines, Honduras, Indonesia, Yemen and Vietnam.

0306.21-110: Total imports 9,549 of which: New Zealand 4,754 and Australia 4,633. Major suppliers among developing countries are Indonesia and Philippines.

0306.22-100: Total imports 3,044 of which: Canada 2,072 and United States 879.

Market characteristics

With imports totalling 49 billion yen in 1991 (US\$ 400 million), Japan is the second largest world importer of lobster after the United States.

Frozen lobsters cover two-thirds of the market of imported lobster in Japan. Given, however, the consumers' preference for fresh fish products, imports of these categories showed a relatively higher growth. The spiny, non-clawed lobster imported from Australia and New Zealand, are more popular than the clawed species imported principally from Canada and the United States.

Lobster is considered a gourmet product to be consumed for special events, with December being the peak period. The demand is higher in urban areas and with the restaurant industry.

Market access

The rate of customs duty applicable to imports of lobsters and lobster products are 3% (ad valorem), under the provisions of the Japanese Customs Tariff Law (the above tariff applies to GATT's member states whereas the "General" tariff is 10% and the "Temporary" is of 4%).

The Temporary Tariff Measures Law grant duty-free entrance for lobsters originating from the Least Developed Countries (LDCs).

Imports are subject to the Food Sanitation Law. The Japanese administration is very strict concerning any residual antibiotics and cholera germs: when some are detected, the Customs Office is obliged by law to order the disposal or return of the shipment.

Packaging and transport

See EC overview for information about packaging of lobster. Concerning transport, it must be noted that in the last few years, there has been a considerable increase in air shipments of all crustaceans, including lobsters.

Distribution channels

Lobsters are mainly imported by fishery companies and trading companies which deliver them either to specialized primary wholesalers or to central wholesale markets.

Sales of fish products through supermarkets and department stores increase regularly; small retail outlets tend to disappear or to constitute buying groups.

Market opportunities

Demand for lobster is growing and it increasingly relies on imports as domestic catches decrease. Consumer buy high-value fish products, and imports of lobsters are expected to continue growing.

Good prospects exist for new suppliers from developing countries offering a high quality product, as required by this market. Competition from already established suppliers is strong.
